Memory-Work I: The Politics and Implications of Truth-Telling

Session description: Communities inside and outside of the Southeast US are increasingly engaged in memory-work, which is the politics and processes of remembering and recovering from the wounds of racialized violence, inequality and exclusion. This memory-work refers to a broad range of social actors, practices, and places associated with coming to terms with these painful legacies, removing oppressive commemorative structures, as well as creating new memorial forms that open up opportunities for racial reconciliation and for marginalized groups, in particular communities of color, to assert their rights and legitimacy. Memory-work is an important analytical lens for understanding the complexities and challenges of this memory-justice nexus while also providing scholars an ethical framework for guiding their publicly-engaged research and the solidarity and support they lend to reparative memory projects. In this first of two special sessions, established and emerging voices in the geographical study of memory-work come together to address the contested politics and implications of truth-telling about enslaved labor, racialized lynching, the Confederacy, and long-held traditions of erasing Black memory.

Racism, Agri-food Regimes, and Justice in the U.S. South

Session description

In the past two decades, attempts by Black, Native, and Latinx farmers to counter systematic exclusion from agricultural assistance by federal agencies such as the USDA have been curtailed by opposition from primarily white agro-industrial lobby groups and limited political will. Concrete measures to address ongoing historical injustices in agriculture have often been derided as 'reparations' and reverse racism, yet racism in agriculture has been central to the precipitous decline of farmers in America (Orozco et al. 2018; Graddy-Lovelace 2017; Wright et al. 2020). Policies that benefit largescale white farms and agro-industry at the expense of agricultural workers and small-scale farmers have been structured by racism in inception and implementation and have contributed to the disinvestment and depopulation of rural landscapes (Williams & Freshour 2022). Although such policies have often been advocated in the name of agricultural productivity and "food security", food apartheid as Karen Washington describes it (Brones 2018) continues to undermine foodways and abundance in urban and rural contexts alike. However, there is a rich tradition of work and organizing in the South that has confronted agri-food injustice and nurtured alternatives. From the cooperative development strategies of Black farmers to Fannie Lou Hamer's work to build spaces free from agrarian oppression (Alkon and Mares 2012; Grant et al. 2012; McCutcheon 2019; White 2018), abundance in the South has been continuously cultivated through visions and practices that challenge and seek to supplant the violent rationalities of dominant agri-food regimes (Woods 2017). This session features work that examines how racism shapes the political economy and ecologies of southern food and agriculture, alongside papers that highlight the work of food justice, environmental justice, and land justice in southern agri-food systems.


